Does Deregulation Hurt The Environment?

Today the American Action Forum (@AAF) released a new infographic examining the deregulatory efforts of both President Trump and President Obama. AAF analysis finds that while there has been a spotlight on President Trump's deregulatory push, President Obama also made strides in deregulation. It might surprise supporters and detractors of the previous administration that President Obama actually issued 101 rules that reduced compliance costs. However, the historic amount of new regulations from the Obama Administration wiped out any deregulatory cost savings his administration had made. Regardless of the net effect, President Obama did reduce regulatory burdens and he was able to do so in a way that didn't result in dirtier air and water.

To some, deregulation means "hampering the government's ability to ensure we have clean air, drinkable water, and safe food." This language is hyperbole.

President Obama issued 101 rules that reduced compliance costs without harming the environment. President Trump has time to replicate these small victories from the previous administration.

REDUCED COSTS

President Trump does not want to upend the Clean Air Act. It's far easier to tweak uncontroversial aspects of past rules than to push for full-scale repeal.



A Full Repeal?

Presidents Carter, Reagan, Clinton, and Obama all managed to reduce regulatory costs without full-scale repeal.

President Trump will likely replicate those earlier efforts while keeping our air and water clean.

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
